Dear Spiers,

I was very glad to hear from you today. Several times lately Biddy & I have been talking about our holiday & saying how it all now seems like a dream. If we get any holidays next year I should think the Isle of Skye will be also - the only possible place.

It is quite all right about the money. In these times however, as you apparently appreciate, one never knows what may happen either to oneself or to the currency position, and as I am anxious to safeguard the position of my family as far as possible against any contingency that may arise, I suggest that you might agree that if there is a serious depreciation in the value of currency between now & when you repay the loan, your repayment would be an amount which would have approximately

The same purchasing power then as £300 has now. ~~If~~ If money appreciates, the converse would apply, but I can't see it doing this. I suggest this as a "gentlemen's agreement" not a business contract, & if you don't like it we can agree to omit it.

I suggest that you consider the loan to be for a nominal period of five years. This should enable you to clear off your other obligations before you start worrying about this. Unless I am short of money in the meantime, I would prefer to be repaid in a lump sum, otherwise I might only fritter it away if repaid in instalments. If at the end of five years it is still not convenient for you to repay it, then you could pay interest on it at the rate then current for bank overdraft.

Perhaps I should explain further my ideas about inflation. If I was not lending you this money

I would at the present time try & invest  
it in house property, possibly by buying  
Glynshiria. If the same happens as in  
the last war, then in 3 or 4 years time  
£300 worth of house property may then  
be worth say £500, but the same  
cause should create a corresponding  
increase in the money value of your income  
(apart altogether from increase due to  
your progress in your profession) so  
that repaying £500 would only mean the  
same to you in real value as repaying  
£300 if the inflation had not occurred  
(and perhaps it won't, for the govt  
seem to be taking better control of  
these things than they did the last  
time, in fact some of their moves are  
almost Social Credit.)

Do you want me to send you  
the money now or not until you  
actually decide the wedding day?  
The savings bank may want about  
a week's notice for me to withdraw  
it. Let me know when you want  
it.

So far I can't say I have been terribly busy. We have had A.R.P. stuff of course but electricity, & clothes, between the blackouts & all the visitors then leaving or not arriving, pictures etc shut, has simply flopped. The load on the last Sat in August was 800 K.W., on Sat and Sept the corresponding figure was 290 K.W. also all extensions, wiring work etc is practically stopped. All the members of the D.S.C. were asked some time ago to volunteer for N.M.S., the same idea of a central register as the B.M.A., & apart from leaving the family I won't be sorry if they send me somewhere else there is a lot more doing. By the way, is the wedding to be in a registry or what, & do I bring over my b.h. hats & give the bride away?
