





Dear Marjorie,

It was with very great sorrow that I learnt of Cecil's passing and, while I was not able to attend his memorial service, I want you to know that I was certainly there in spirit. Since we had relatively little contact in recent years, you may not fully realize what Cecil meant to me. So I hope you will bear with me as I unburden myself.

On one level, Cecil was and always will be my greatest hero. His legendary exploits during the Second World War were indeed the stuff of myths and of heroes. When I was younger I would boast to all who would listen of his militiary heroics. It was not until later that I came to understand the pain, doubt and ambivalence which any such experience must leave in the soul. And yet somehow that only made him a greater hero, because of the way in which he summoned the resolve and the strength to dedicate his life to serving others. To doing what he could to relieve those scars in other souls from conflicts both public and private. Having tried in a much more minor way to help in the healing of souls, I now have some small appreciation for the strength of character and goodness which that implies.

But there were other dimensions in which Cecil holds a special place in my heart. At an uncertain time in my life many, many years ago, he reached out to me in a way in which no-one else could or would. He served as a touchstone as I made that awkward transition from childhood to young adulthood. It seemed extra-ordinary to me that someone of such legendary proportions could possibly care about an ordinary country kid like me. And yet in doing so he gave me a sense of self-worth that served me the rest of my life. Cecil's patience and understanding therefore filled a very important need during an important time in my life.

As with all such relationships, there are random moments which remain forever imprinted in the memory. I vividly recall Cecil trying to

teach me to play the zither he had recently purchased. I think the place was the student rooms he was then occupying somewhere near Queens. As with many such recollections, the memory is more of a special feeling than any sequence of events. For me, the feeling was one of a special bond which took me beyond the dimensions of my previous existence.

And so I feel that I was greatly privileged to have known my uncle Cecil. His memory will always be with me and, in ways that I may only dimly perceive, his lessons will always guide and help me. Moreover, I know that he must have touched countless others in similar ways. I hope that, in the midst of your sorrow, it is at least some comfort to recognize that he lives on in so many ways.

I will try to find out about other options and let you know. Your idea about

doing the national museum ... and teotihuacan both the same day is very chalengig. You coud go early to <u>Teotihuacan</u> so that you get there about 10 am (the <u>timemost</u> of the stuff opens). This is one of the most interesting places and one of the oldest too, but 3 hrs should be more than enough. There are two big places there. One has the pyramids of the sun and moon and the palace of quetzal-papaotl, the other is the "ciudadela" where the pyramid of <u>quetzalcoatl</u> is located. The two places are at each end of the 'calzada de los muertos' (road of the dead) which is very long (2km, about) and hard to walk (have to go up the stairs, down the stairs,
